Dancing Brolgas down south...

A brolga pair has recently been in temporary residence in the wetlands west of Maria River Road north of Goolawah. Harvey photographed them in early August as they started their famous dance: "Experts used to think the brolga dance was a mating





ritual, but now say they just dance whenever they feel like it! Brolgas seem to come back every year to the same place, so with luck, and good land management, those two will stay."

The name Brolga comes from the Gamilaraay language in northern NSW, where they are called burralga. In the Arnhemland language of the Yolngu people it is known as gudurrku, made famous by a Yothu Yindi song. Various Aboriginal legends and dances are associated with the bird.

Bush Heritage (BH) describes them as "one of Australia's largest flying birds, standing a metre tall with a wing span of up to 2.4 metres. They're one of two members of the Gruidae (crane) family in Australia."


Vulnerable in NSW

According to NSW Office of Environment & Heritage the brolga was "formerly found across Australia, except for the south-east corner, Tasmania and the south-western third of the country. It is still abundant in the northern tropics, but very sparse across the southern part of its range."

BH says that while not considered migratory, they're partially nomadic, flying to different areas following seasonal rainfall; and that the omnivorous brolgas feed and breed in open wetlands, coastal mudflats and irrigated croplands.

BH confirms that during the breeding season (Sep-Dec in the south) a pair will return to its breeding site to build a nest - an island mound made with sticks, grass and sedges - sometimes to the same spot for 20 years.

The Australian brolga population is considered 'secure' with 20 to 100 thousand birds in the north. But the southern population, estimated at 1000 birds, is dwindling and the species is listed as vulnerable in NSW, SA and Victoria.



Birds Australia: "Within NSW, Brolga numbers have been much reduced because of widespread drainage of suitable habitat for agriculture, land reclamation and water regulation."

Keep wetlands in a natural state

Harvey again: "Seeing these fabulous wading birds so near to Goolawah makes it imperative that we act to keep the wetlands which are part of Goolawah in a natural state, and continue to keep all dogs out of the property. Perhaps one day these majestic birds will land here once again."

It doesn't seem likely that our species came to dominate the planet because of higher intelligence or better toolmaking capabilities. 20.000 years ago *homo sapiens* probably had higher intelligence and toolmaking skills than the average individual today – and was physically stronger than the species is toady.

In the Stone Age natural selection tested you every day, every moment. If you flunked any of these tests you died. Yet despite our ancestor's superior skills, humankind as a whole was much weaker then than it is today.

Over those 20.000 years humankind moved from hunting mammoths with stone-tipped spears to exploring the solar system with space ships. The crucial factor here was not the evolution of more dexterity. No! Our conquest of the world was due to our ability to connect many humans to one another. Our dominion of the planet is not because individuals are smarter, more nimble-fingered than the individual chimp or wolf, but because homo sapiens is the only species capable of co-operating flexibly in huge numbers. If humans had not been capable of this, we'd still be splitting flint stones - instead of uranium atoms.

Bees and ants learned co-operation millions of years earlier – so, why didn't they beat us to the nuclear bomb? Bees' co-operation lacks flexibility. They cannot reinvent their social system overnight. If a hive faces a new threat or opportunity - the bees cannot, eg., guillotine the queen and establish a republic.

Mammals like elephants and chimpanzees do co-operate more flexibly than bees but only in small numbers. Their co-operation is based on personal acquaintance: the chimp must know the other guy personally or no-go... perhaps even animosity.

Only homo sapiens can co-operate in huge numbers with total strangers! It is this concrete capability, rather than some external soul (religion) or some unique kind of consciousness (philosophy), that explains our mastery of the Earth!

Yes, homo goolius, co-operation is the key!

Fair Trading Advice

on running a co-operative

I know, it sounds boring, but in the weeks before the AGM members might like to check out the Fair Trading website: (fairtrading.nsw.gov.au/ftw/Co-operatives_and_associations/Running_a_cooperative.page?.)

It provides a guide to the legal and other responsibilities that a co-operative must adhere to once registered. This will be of particular interest if you're thinking of nominating to be a director. During my time as a director I often referred to the Goolawah Director and Office Holder Manual and to the Fair Trading Website. If you haven't had a turn at being a director, I'd like to encourage you to have a go. Sometimes challenging, but mostly enjoyable, providing a real insight into the value of co-operative living.

This quote comes from 'Co-operatives in Australia A Manual - Understanding the purpose, start-up process, planning and running of a co-operative in Australia - Prepared by RDA Mid North Coast for the Co-operatives Federation of New South Wales July 2013':

'Co-operatives were first established over 500 years ago and are one of the oldest types of business. The social principles that guide co-operatives are principles that humanity, at its best, have used to survive, share and thrive since early palaeolithic times. In the tradition of their founders, co-operative members believe in the ethical values of honesty, openness, social responsibility, equality, solidarity and caring for others'.

Saying Sorry

The community is trying to elaborate policies on dispute resolution and breaches of the code of conduct. Of course this is challenging, as we try to work out processes to provide recourse for members who feel aggrieved about the behaviour of others or how they were treated.

I support those efforts, but feel that as individuals we should also take responsibility for our own actions and behaviour. When I resigned as a director in July, I apologised if I had inadvertently contributed to the troubles over the logging issue. I also suggested that others take an honest look at their own behaviour, and apologise if necessary, to whoever they need to.

At the September Community Meeting I suggested that the 'Apologies' item in our agenda (when we pass on other members' apologies for missing the meeting) be expanded. It could be an opportunity for actual public apologies by members themselves to individuals or the community at large.

Entirely voluntary, this act of contrition could help

to clear the air, promote healing and give an opportunity for aggrieved parties to move towards forgiveness and even reconciliation.



Naturally an insincere apology would not do the job! Apologies are a simple but powerful tool, used in counselling, mediation & psychological practice, and the core of Truth & Reconciliation commissions and groups around the world following societal trauma. The benefits of apologies can be far-reaching. And it's do-it-yourself.

Done sincerely apologies may even obviate the need for more formal dispute resolution. In our can-do, DIY Goolawah culture, surely as individuals we can try to set things right, and have the courage to simply say SORRY!

Resolutions for October 2017 meeting

Resolution I

Road Levy for financial year 2017/18 to be \$500.00 billed (quarterly) in accordance with normal billing procedure.

Rationale: The \$500 road levy for 2017/18 was unanimously approved at the 1 April 2017 meeting (as it was at the 2 April 2016 meeting for 2016/17). This was necessary in order to include it in the 1 July 2017 invoice run. The question was raised whether, as a matter of procedure, this should be the subject for a formal resolution.

Proposed: John Tennock Seconded: Ralph Erthel

Resolution 2

Road levy to continue as a regular levy until the DA finally approved and any associated roadworks costs covered. The amount to be agreed by vote at the April general meeting without the need for a special resolution.

Rationale: All road levies collected are being accumulated into a 'DA Road Fund' budget. This is still short of expectations about what the total cost might be so we need to continue accumulating these funds. Road maintenance is not taken out of this budget and is funded, so far, by normal annual levies. Once the DA is approved and associated road work completed, the road budget arrangements can be reviewed.

Resolution 3

Proposed amendment to by-law re dogs
That visitors with dogs be allowed to stay with a
Goolawah member for a maximum of


2 or 3 nights.

With the proviso that the dog is tied up/on a lead, only within the perimeter of the host member's site. That the dog is well trained & well behaved, and under the supervision of a responsible owner at all times.

Please note, that when the above conditions are not adhered to, Goolawah reserves the right to ask the member that their visiting dog leaves the property forthwith.

Rationale: Some Goolawah members have relatives or close friends whom they would like to have visit & stay in their home for a few nights accompanied by their family dog. When the above conditions are complied with, and there is no disturbance to wildlife or neighbours, then these occasional visits can be made possible thereby meeting the needs of some of our members.

23 Nest Vacancies


John Seed's *Deep Ecology Workshop* in May brought a man to Goolawah who's an expert on nest boxes: Trevor Smith. He later returned to the Co-op with 23 bird boxes to install. These boxes are very well made and took time to build, but considering that it takes a tree about 100 years to form a natural hollow this work is surely worth it. His boxes vary in size and their openings and box shapes are specially designed for different species.

A group of members (Frank, Paul, Sattwa, Wayne, Mark) then helped Trevor to find suitable spots all around Goolawah for those hand crafted nesting stations. After several months it would be interesting to do a first survey and find out if and by whom they have been used. Paul will get a camera in the next months and see who is in the boxes. Maybe someone has seen movement around them in recent weeks? Let us know! Apart from some very different bird species the nest boxes could be used by gliders and possums.

PS: If you're interested in building your own nest box, the birdsinbackyards.net website has developed twelve different nest box plans with useful background and instructions. Julica



New walkways



Several new trails have been cleared on Goolawah communal land in recent months. Griff's mud map above shows their location. Between Goldmine Hill and the Three Island Dam, Wayne, Roger, Michael and other Men's Shedders cleared a new, tractor-wide walking trail, meandering through bushland and forest. It's about a kilometre long and accessible via a side track from Illa Langi Road. Both trails still need a name.

The oldest of the new trails was a track Roger and

Belinda cleared west of Forest Way. It's called Gums Walk and has already got a hand-carved road sign. It's also tractor-wide and connects Forest Way with the bottom of Verity's lot and Greg's Walk between Bowl and Burrendong. About half a year ago Anne cleared another, footpath-wide walking trail (not on this map) behind Red Hill dam. It goes past beautiful old gums and leads south east to the new border road. Look out for the red ribbons.

Kevin's Goolawah sketchbook


Kevin adds this memory about his loo drawing on Forest Way:

"Russ moved to Goolawah early on. His camp and dunny were later shown to be on common ground, the dunny was therefore declared to be "public".


Others have used it, myself included, from time to time, until they've built one for themselves. It has proven to be a very handy structure and is part of our history, sadly being considered for demolition."

BOOK REVIEW

The History of Money

When exploring uncharted territory it is always wise to have a guide with good local knowledge and the ability to communicate it clearly. Such a guide can help us avoid unproductive dead-ends. Our Goolawah enterprise could be considered a bold exploration of alternative

economic models. Unfortunately the potentially useful guides, those who have studied and understood economics, are usually locked into the conventional system of banks and corporations and unable to explore radical alternatives.

According to Wikipedia Charles Eisenstein is a public speaker, self-described "degrowth activist" and the author of several books including The Ascent of Humanity (2007), Sacred Economics (2011), and The More Beautiful World Our Hearts Know Is Possible (2013). He has a

deep understanding of economic principles and how to communicate them.

Sacred Economics traces the history of money from ancient gift economies to modern capitalism, revealing how the money system has contributed to alienation, competition, and scarcity, destroyed community, and necessitated endless growth. Today, these trends have reached their extreme—but in the wake of their collapse, we may find great opportunity to transition to a more connected, ecological, and sustainable way of being.

For me, reading Sacred Economics generated the seeds of a few ideas that could fruitfully be planted in the fertile soil of the Goolawah community. Rather that use this space I will leave it to others who might read the book to see what they might find.

Mid North Coast library service has Eisenstein's two other books. I have submitted a purchase suggestion for *Sacred Economics*.


We light bonfires because we can.



Kale Chips - too easy!

Kale is mainly good for you. Foodies say it's packed with anti-inflammatory and anti-oxidant properties, high in fibre and iron, in omega-3 and 6, in vitamins K, D, B6 plus a great source of calcium. In case you feel like a change from steaming or stir-frying it, try kale chips. But baking them fast and hot can make them soggy in the big bits and burned at the thin ends. The solution: slow and low.

Stu helped the recipe editor and tried out how kale chips work in a solar oven. He baked them for about 15 minutes, at medium low temperature, and I assure



The other trick to awesome kale chips is to flavour them up. Rub them with oil, sprinkle them with anything you like: salt of course, quinoa flakes, lemon rind, paprika, grated parmesan, pepper. I found one recipe that even suggested to sprinkle a bit of brown sugar before you bake them.

Ingredients

- · I large bunch of kale
- I to 2tbsp olive oil
- 1/4 to 1/2 tsp salt
- · other spices

Instructions

- Line 2 baking sheets with baking paper. Arrange racks on upper and lower third of oven. Preheat to 150°C.
- · Remove stems and ribs from the kale. Tear into small pieces, rinse, pat dry, removing all water.

- Spread the kale over the baking sheets. Drizzle with olive oil then rub oil in with hands to ensure the kale is coated evenly. Sprinkle with salt and any seasonings.
- Bake for 15 minutes, rotate sheets and bake for 10 to 12 more minutes or until chips are dry, crispy and evenly baked.

A simple sign can do the job, as long as people can see it. I can think of at least four lived-on sites on Cockatoo Ridge



without numbers, at least six in Outback, Bowl and Burrendong and six on Red Hill.

Could you please spare an hour and help get this count to nil before the fire season begins and before the next Gazette? If you don't have time for your hand chiselled masterpiece or figurative artwork at the moment, how about taking an easy-impro-approach for now - like these examples - and create the Beauty-Number of your Dreams in the future?

May Board & Community Meeting Minutes

6th May 2017 Commenced 9.00am Chair: Peter O'Hara Minutes: Ralph Erthel

Apologies: Rose Mahar, Tony & Louise Roberts, D&D Cobourn, Sattwa Horne.

Business Arising from Previous Meetings:

Cemetery: area at Goldmine Hill Rd has been marked out, approx 30x30m; members are encouraged to inspect, and discuss at 03 June Meeting. Vision Statement: data amount larger than expected; however preliminary report expected for June meeting.

Secretary's Report

- Three overdue members usual follow-up endorsed again.
- Valuer General's 2017 property valuation for the Co-op's land increased from \$810,000 to \$815,000 (so minimal raise in KSC rates); new Emergency Agency Levy to be invoiced separately this year and amount to be advised by NSW govt. in June.

Roads Report

Recent roadworks cost \$10,000 for Nevertire (quote \$10-15,000), \$25,000 for internal roads (as quoted) and \$1,000 for 'extras' (Illa Langi, Machinery Shed, Forest Way). The meeting expressed appreciation for quality of roadworks.

DA Report

Ralph reported unsatisfactory/unclear phone conversation with KSC's Shane Reinhold re our unanswered Section 96; opportunity to attend Council Meeting 16/5 at Frederickton to speak with directors Pitt & Scott; tabled letter to them to be delivered "by hand" after removal of cattle grid & gate reference to Nevertire/Maria intersection; ensuing debate about the Co-op's position on the future of the gate & grid again inconclusive — to be re-visited at coming meetings.

Membership Report

Janet Munro has completed the process and was voted unanimously to be ratified as Kevin's guest; Rick & Jack will attend June meeting and this will complete their obligations for membership eligibility; Dharma Browngedge (Mohini's Dad) is visiting and has been issued *Guest Handbook*; paperwork for Justin & Leah to be completed for Zen, now turned 18, as per membership policy.

Machinery Report

Tractor 3 point linkage ingeniously repaired by Roger and the meeting

was grateful; new floor in machinery section of Ag-Shed welcomed; all equipment working.

Fire Report

All equipment in order; Paul reported on the fire working bee tidying up the shed and surveying possible fire hazard reduction burns for the near future; he will call for working bees in suitable weather conditions; piles at Goldmine Hill will also be burnt.

Treasury Report

John's report accepted unanimously (prop. Ralph, sec. Craig); to clarify "Annual Levy" will be called "Membership Levy"; several members voiced problems with lucidity of treasury statements (payments overlapping etc.); whilst payments should always be made "on invoice" (rather than in response to statements), meeting resolved to ask John to issue Reconciliation Statements in a 3-monthly rhythm and send them a week before the due date (unanimous).

Resolutions:

That the decision of the April General Meeting to maintain the road levy of \$500 per share for the financial year 2017/18 be ratified (procedural only, as resolution was omitted from March Newsletter): prop. Julica, sec. Roger, approved unanimously.

That a group be formed to review and recommend options for signage and traffic exclusion measures on Northgate and Illa Langi Roads. Trinh, Alan, Paul, Bronwyn and Griff volunteered to form the group, with Ralph to provide initial brief re. R. Scott's suggestions from KSC experience.

General Business:

- Keenans' request to have Anadean's 2016 guest fees waived: lengthy
 discussion and the meeting was unable to reach a decision; deferred to
 June meeting and it was felt desirable for Luke and/or Ishbel to attend
 and 'make their case'.
- · Logging access for neighbour Chris Robbins. Peter reported on an incident on Red Hill Road on Thursday afternoon 04 May, when a semiloader carrying a huge logging machine entered Red Hill Road. Paul Martin blocked the truck with Anne's car. When the truck driver (Paul) went to unload the logging machine Paul M moved the car behind the loader. Justin Bollard was there and had a heated exchange with Paul M. The car driver's side window was broken. Peter & Julica then arrived on the scene, and Ralph E & Griff soon after. The logging company was engaged to partially clear Chris Robbin's block, and its supervisor Matt Osborne arrived too. We (Ralph, Peter, Julica, Griff) then spoke by phone loud speaker to Chris Robbins, who said he had informed Dave Launt. After more heated argument between Paul and Justin the logging truck reversed out of Red Hill & left. Apparently police had been called but did not arrive in time. Peter later contacted KSC to check on Robbins' EPA approval for the clearing, but had not been called back by a Council officer who promised to check.

Members expressed their appreciation of Paul standing up for Goolawah policy (September 2016 decision to exclude logging trucks on our private roads), and agreed to reimburse the cost of repairs to Anne's broken window (prop. Trinh, sec. Nityama; 9 for 1 against). Justin and Paul have different versions of how the car window was broken. Rob presented Justin's version of events in his absence. A motion confirming the exclusion of logging trucks on Goolawah roads was voted unanimously (prop. Anne W, sec. Nityama) Ralph E discussed the incident by phone with Chris Robbins, who undertook to pay for road damage caused by any future operations, and to meet with us next weekend. Relevant members are not available then, so the following weekend will be proposed. Concern was also raised about possible damage to Illa Langi ("corduroy road" base of tree logs) from a high volume of heavy vehicle traffic, estimated at 100 trips by logger Matt. Ralph E will obtain advice from our engineer Mike Dutton about possible weight limits to safeguard those road foundations. The meeting with Chris R will address access issues and possible legal documents.

Advice from our lawyer M. Young is that the Co-operative has full right to control access to the Frog Hollow road section, which is located on our land. The meeting agreed that the Co-operative is very keen to build and maintain good relations with Chris R, and is open to discussions.

 Anne requested that Co-op dispute resolution procedures with her and Justin be invoked. The Secretary will invite him to take part in mediation, with Trinh offering to act as mediator.

Other issue:

Discussion of the designated fire & access trail on Justin & Leah's lot, and agreed that the Secretary should write to them about opening it up. Following 'Gratitude Round' the meeting closed at 1 pm.



June Board & Community Meeting Minutes

3rd June 2017

Chris Robbins (new neighbour, formerly Wauchop's block) attended the meeting and presented his plans. He also answered questions and listened to suggestions from the community. There followed a lot of discussion about the situation and possible impact on the community with the main problem being protection of our roads. There was also a lot of concern for the environmental impact of a large logging operation. Chris has offered to pay for any road damage. Voting on whether to allow logging trucks to use our roads was deferred until the July GM.

Most members present felt it would be better for all concerned to encourage Chris towards a smaller and more environmentally sustainable logging operation using a Lukas/bush mill on site.

Proposal: To give permission for Chris Robbins to transport sawn timber from a Lukas mill via Illa Langi/ Frog Hollow Road.

Everyone deserves to be treated with respect and integrity and feel safe where they live.

Membership Report:

Dharma completing Guest Application. Discussion regarding targeted advertising for attracting new members eg. *Earth Garden*. We have done this in the past. Cindy advertised on *Gumtree* and realestate.com. Marion Arent share sale still not finalised. 2 or 3 shares are currently available for sale. One enquiry from a Kempsey person. We need to be mindful of all kinds of discrimination, including age.

ACTION: Nityama to do some research.

Machinery Report:

Minor problem with hydraulics from jammed stick – seems to have rectified itself.

Fire Squad:

Now is the time to burn – early fire restrictions are anticipated. Mark would like a small triangle burn near his share. Pile near Dan's share needs burning. Lower North Coast Community Engagement Brigade have written report (post on website). The following need attention; all shares require a number, some shares need slashing and mowing of long grass, some shares have a lot of 'stuff' with long grass close to buildings, dam walls need slashing, one share with plies of gum leaves will cause ember attack if ignited, meshing under houses recommended, low intensity burns of leaf litter recommended (will not impact flora and fauna), some properties considered 'undefendable' given the condition. They have offered to talk to groups / individuals regarding Fire Survival Plans. Will complete a post check after we have acted on recommendations. Need some way of putting out small spot fires – Roger recommends buckets, water cans, start small and add to your Plan.

Treasurer's Report:

3 members have now been contacted by debt collectors.

Work and Expenses Claims:

Work Claims for approval - Gemma and Todd \$150, Peter and Julica \$500. Proposed - Dan Seconded - Lexie Approved Unanimously

General Business Agenda Items:

I. Code of Conduct - complaints and concerns received by Directors after the July GM regarding Paul's behaviour.

Directors gave an overview – Following the July GM Directors received a number of complaints regarding Paul and Anne's behaviour. A letter was sent inviting them to attend a meeting with Directors on the 29th July. Only Anne attended – she was encouraged to bring a support person. 5 Directors attended. The recent logging issue and the writing of the proposal triggered singling out of Directors and inappropriate, disrespectful and abusive behaviour. Paul's chairing of the July GM and 'waving' of the Code of Conduct upset a number of members who'd been bullied and intimidated by Paul both in the past and up to present day. These complaints have been coming for years. Being a Director is a difficult enough job, without having to deal with such serious behaviour complaints. Paul went into Craig's space and was very disrespectful in front of his family

(since apologised). Given Paul didn't attend the meeting, an email was sent to him advising his behaviour would be discussed at today's meeting. He has singled out Ralph E, by lodging a referral form with the Community lustice Centre requesting Ralph attend mediation with him sighting the main issues as continued harassment and abuse of an office position. Members have taken out AVOs against each out in the past. Both Michael and Rob wanted to know how to make a written complaint against Paul. At the meeting attended by Chris Robbins, Paul referenced a study by David Lindameyer?. Michael was familiar with the study and felt the community was being misled. Craig confirmed reference to this study was removed from the logging issue proposal as it was irrelevant. Rob spoke about Paul's aggressive and rude behaviour towards him over the years, and was deeply offended regarding his chairing of the July GM. He also spoke about the meeting when John Harkin was publicly humiliated by Paul. Denise and Dennis have been singled out and experienced inappropriate emails, unwanted and unwelcome visits from Paul and Anne in the past related to expressing opinions over the extension of the camp kitchen and the Red Hill Fire Shelter. Denise put these complaints into an email to Directors at the time. She suggested this is a pattern of behaviour that occurs when others disagree or express a differing opinion. Lexie commented we have no process for lodging complaints, and asked if members would be interested in training a team in conflict resolution. Nityama felt a process was essential, and it wasn't useful to drag up issues from the past. She reminded members Paul and Anne were separate people with separate interests. Dan was very concerned regarding fracturing in the community. Russell mentioned psychological insights into bullying, and in the past he'd taken action against a member by going to the police (member is no longer at Goolawah). Kevin felt acts of past bullying remained very relevant and should be raised. Need a process to raise specific incidents.

NOTE: As minute taker I wouldn't normally be so specific, but given the seriousness of the issue, I tried to capture what each member said. If there are any inaccuracies they can be amended at the September CM.

2. Code of Conduct - proposal for implementation.

Round the circle comments on how to move forward:

"Tension has made me withdraw, need to listen to each other; everyone has a right to be heard; we need volunteers to be trained as mediators; take responsibility for your actions; KISS principal, formulate a simple process; training could help; being listened to is very important; keep to the speed limit – this is simple thing, and some can't even do that; safe and neutral environments are important to express concerns; I would volunteer time and energy to help develop a fair process; written complaints are important; need members to be trained in conflict resolution; need to stick to our processes and agreed strategies; need simple steps for implementing a process for breaches of the Code of Conduct; By-laws mean nothing if we don't have consequences; need a mandatory process with consequences; any action needs to happen quickly; stay conciliatory; identify behaviour problems; since dawn of time individuals have been breaching codes; enforcement is needed; be mindful of a kangaroo court; Board has really struggled to deal with this; need consequences for bad behaviour; fines may be an issue for some".

ACTION: Form a committee to discuss the draft proposal/process for implementation of the Code of Conduct (Denise has already drafted a proposal for Implementation of the Code of Conduct and circulated to Directors). Denise, Mohini, Dan, Ralph, Nityama, Roger. Committee is open to all and meeting will be put on phone tree.

Question – Are all committees open to members, including Directors meetings. Some commented they should be.

Complaints to Directors regarding breaches of By-Laws - speeding and dogs.

ACTION: Code of Conduct Implementation committee to discuss this.

4. Membership Application Process - feedback.

New member complained to Craig regarding inappropriate comments from a committee person (verbal). Need to be careful not to allow personal biases and judgements to be voiced to prospective members. Entire community sets these protocols, not the committee person. We have a Feedback form — it is difficult for new members to give negative feedback if it is about a particular committee member. As a Director members come to you in trust with all kinds of issues, and we can't reveal their name without consent. They concerned regarding some kind of backlash.

ACTION: Nityama wanted further information regarding feedback from new members. Denise and Craig are open to further discussion.

Rehabilitation of the dam behind Paul and Anne's share. Rob has given a written statement to Directors. An area of approximately I acre behind the dam has been planted with giant structural bamboo. Clay piled up around mature trees has resulted in the trees dying from collar rot. Swamp mahogany and other generating natives are being slashed. Mahogany is a vital food source and is important to the ecosystem. This planting is clearly a commercial quantity of giant bamboo for personal gain, and has been planted by the very people who claim to be conservationists. Rob has successfully rehabilitated on clay around his dam. Bamboo should only be planted on shares, not on community land. Our *Code of Conduct* states 'Respect the environment including land, fauna and flora'.

ACTION: Site to be inspected by Justin, Ralph E, Denise, Rob, Mohini.

- Decision making processes Louise has drafted a suggested idea. Mairead has previously compiled 'Our Rules on Decision Making at Meetings"
 - ACTION: Code of Conduct Implementation committee to discuss this.
- 7. Beehives Peter's proposal (the Bee Man). Peter's proposal to be posted on website. He has the required insurances, specialising in bioactive ingredients (like Manuka), willing to pay an annual fee of \$1000 for sites, suggested 3 sites away from residences, discount honey for residents.

Comment - we need to be sure there is no impact on environment. Proposed — Roger: We allow a trial site at North gate for 6 months. Seconded — Kevin. Abstained - 2
